



Overview

STIC Investments(hereafter, STIC) published its first sustainability report in 2023 in an effort to share its financial and ESG performance with various stakeholders. 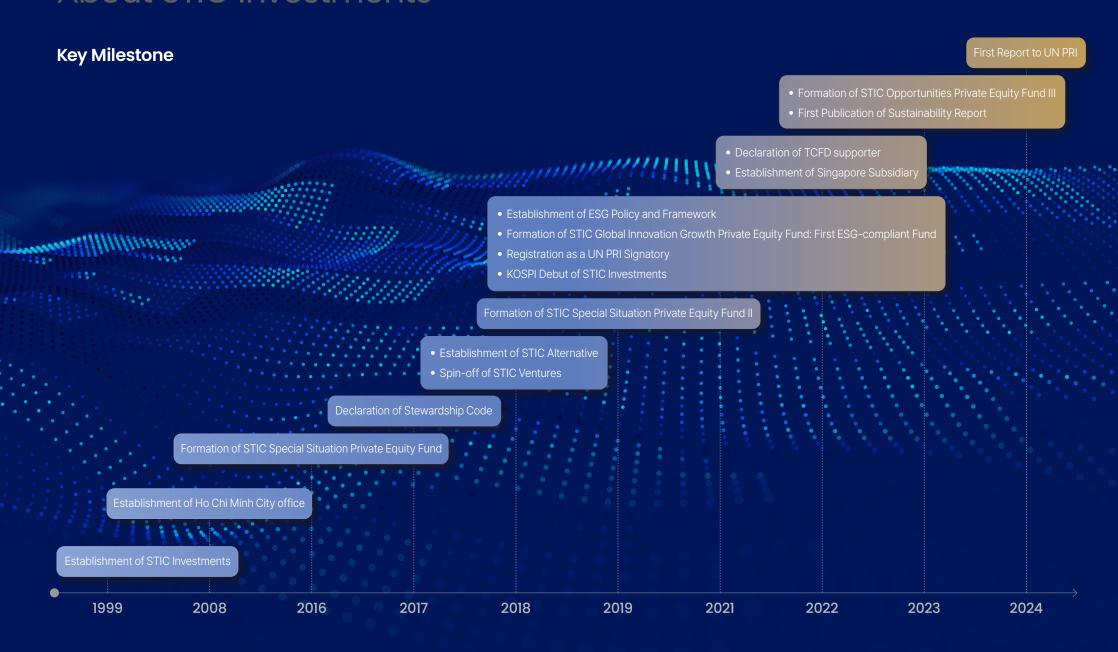

STIC Investments provides a wide range of investment strategies by three differentiated investment divisions in accordance with company growth stages.

STIC Ventures, a subsidiary, invests in varying stages of growth, from seed stage to early-growth and expansion ventures.

Another subsidiary, STIC Alternative, establishes funds from domestic and overseas infrastructure and real estates as an alternative to traditional investment assets



Growth Capital Team

The Growth Capital Team focuses on growth capital investments in mid-sized companies with high growth potential in both domestic and international markets.

Private Equity Division

The PE Division makes pro-active investments in leading companies with strong growth potential that emerge amid global megatrend shifts and corporate restructuring by large enterprises.

Credit Team

The Credit Team provides long-term finance to mediumand large-sized enterprises by employing a stable credit strategy.



STIC Ventures primarily supplies ventures in earlier stages of growth.

STIC ALTERNATIVE

STIC Alternative invests in non-traditional assets: infrastructure and real estate.

Growth Capital Team

The Growth Capital Team provides funding to support the growth and overseas expansion of small and mid-sized enterprises(SMEs), with cross-border investment via STIC's Ho Chi Minh City office serving as a core strategy.

The STIC Global Innovation Growth Fund, launched in 2021 under the Growth Capital Division, is STIC's first ESG-compliant fund. All investment decisions made through the fund are subject to ESG due diligence and formal review by the ESG Committee. The fund successfully attracted a commitment from the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank(AIIB), which places strong emphasis on a manager's ESG capabilities. This led to the establishment of the STIC Asia Infrastructure Innovation Fund in 2022. Based on these accomplishments, STIC was recognized by Korea Development Bank in 2022 as an 'Outstanding ESG Manager.'

ESG Highlight 01

H Energy

H Energy is a leading South Korean company specializing in the development and operation of rooftop solar power plants. By installing photovoltaic systems on unused rooftops of existing buildings, H Energy generates clean, renewable energy without contributing to overdevelopment or environmental degradation. Unlike ground-mounted solar systems, H Energy's rooftop model leverages existing infrastructure to produce energy with minimal environmental impact. This approach contributes to expanding the renewable energy base necessary for a carbon-neutral society. H Energy is also a proactive participant in the RE100 initiative, reinforcing its commitment to sustainability.

Since STIC's investment in 2024, STIC and H Energy have been actively building a comprehensive ESG management system. Guided by STIC's ESG policy framework, H Energy received the 'Family-Friendly Certification' from Korea's Ministry of Gender Equality and Family, highlighting H Energy's exemplary practices in employee well-being and work-life balance. In early 2025, H Energy further strengthened its environmental credentials by obtaining ISO 14001 certification for its environmental management system.

H Energy is committed to continued leadership in renewable energy and sustainability, aiming to contribute to carbon neutrality and the creation of long-term social value.



Private Equity Division

The Private Equity(PE) Division leverages deep industry expertise and extensive investment experience to identify and invest in leading companies aligned with global megatrends. The division actively seeks opportunities in emerging sectors driven by paradigm shifts such as digital transformation(DT), energy transition(ET), and demographic change(DC).

The PE Division focuses on companies undergoing business restructuring, where STIC's value enhancement capabilities can unlock further growth potential. Its core investment strategy centers around an 'opportunity investing' approach—making proactive investments in companies at strategic inflection points characterized by accelerated growth or valuation uplift.

SOF III, managed by the PE Division, integrates ESG factors into company valuations through ESG due diligence conducted by third-party consultants. Improvement areas identified during the ESG review process are incorporated as ESG KPIs and strategically applied to drive value creation.

ESG Highlight 02

Daekyung O&T

Daekyung O&T is the largest domestic supplier of eco-friendly raw materials used in the production of biodiesel and sustainable aviation fuel(SAF). When STIC acquired the company in 2017, Daekyung O&T was primarily engaged in collecting pork fat waste from slaughterhouses and converting it into feedstock and industrial oils—a business model with limited alignment to ESG principles at the time.

Following the acquisition, STIC introduced an ESG-driven management strategy to enhance the company's long-term value. As part of this strategy, Daekyung O&T's operations were transformed into rendering and used oil refining businesses. The company also secured new demand channels in line with global carbon neutrality goals, supplying raw materials for biodiesel, hydrotreated vegetable oil(HVO), and bio-naphtha—thereby repositioning itself as a leading provider of sustainable recycled inputs.

Through STIC's proactive ESG integration, Daekyung O&T successfully transitioned from an animal feed raw material business into a sustainable energy feedstock company. This transformation delivered both financial and ESG value, generating a gross IRR of 19.91% and a MoIC of 2.95x. Daekyung O&T has since become one of STIC's flagship ESG success cases. In recognition of this achievement, STIC received the 'Best ESG Deal' award at the 21st Korea IB Awards hosted by MoneyToday.



Credit Team

The Credit Team focuses on mid-sized M&A transactions in the corporate lending and acquisition finance markets, reflecting the core nature of credit investments that seek mid-risk, mid-return outcomes.

The team is targeting the launch of a blind fund in 2025 and plans to continue pursuing stable returns through credit strategies that include mezzanine financing, structured equity investments, corporate loans, and acquisition financing.

In line with regulatory standards, STIC Ventures fully complies with anti-money laundering(AML) laws and rigorously implements customer due diligence(CDD) procedures prior to all transactions. In addition, STIC Ventures contributes to social value by fostering job creation—exemplified by the establishment of the STIC Youth Employment Fund in 2019.

STIC Ventures practices ESG management by investing in sustainability-driven innovators, including companies in the secondary battery space, alternative protein development, and food upcycling. 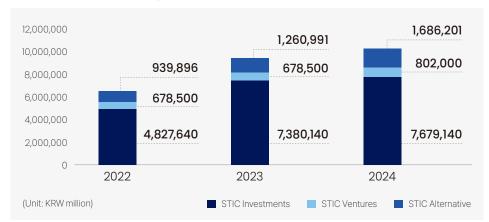

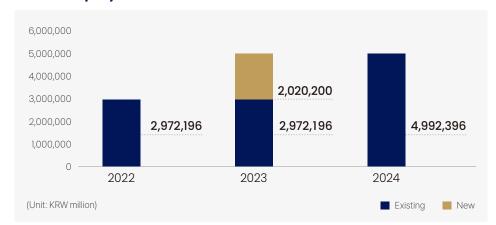
Assets Under Management

STIC Financial Group AUM Overview

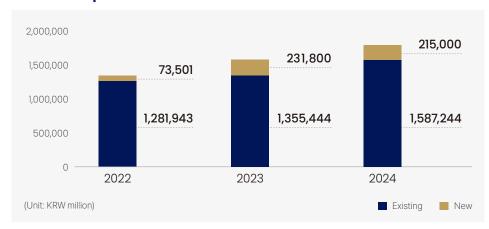


Private Equity Division AUM Overview

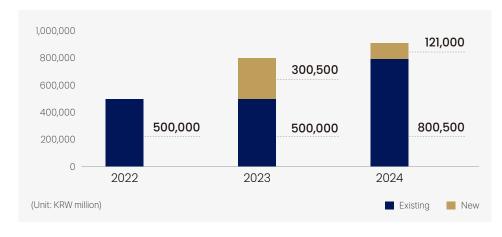

ESG in Investment

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ESG Mission and Vision

1. Introduction

Since the founding of STIC Investments under the declared goal of 'Contribution to the Society through Our Investment,' STIC has strived to fulfill its corporate social responsibility. Rising as a global corporate citizen with STIC's influence stretching beyond South Korea, STIC continues to be responsible for sustainable management.

STIC is creating ESG values based on the ESG vision and mission as below. ESG vision and mission contains STIC's aspiration for responsible investments and is based on the ESG values of 3C: 'Core, Comprehensive, Collaboration.' The ESG vision, mission, and values are implemented throughout the investment process.



ESG Governance

ESG Policy

In May 2021, STIC Investments established its first ESG policy, incorporating the six principles of the UN Principles for Responsible Investment (UN PRI). The policy outlines the integration of ESG considerations throughout the entire investment lifecycle—from deal sourcing and due diligence to investment decision-making, value creation, and exit. STIC's ESG policy aligns not only with the UN PRI but also with the vision of the 17 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs). STIC continuously revises and strengthens its ESG policy to reflect evolving global standards and best practices.

STIC firmly believes that through strict adherence to its ESG policy, it can contribute to building a sustainable future for its portfolio companies, shareholders, fund investors, and the broader society.

Commitment to Global ESG Initiatives

UN PRI Signatory



The United Nations Principles for Responsible Investment (UN PRI) is a global initiative launched by former UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan to encourage the integration of ESG factors into investment decision-making. As of March 2024, a total of 5,345 organizations have signed on to the UN PRI, representing a combined AUM of approximately USD 128.4 trillion.

STIC Investments became a signatory to the UN PRI in July 2021 and submitted its first Transparency Report in July 2024. In this inaugural report, STIC received the highest rating($\star\star\star\star\star$) in the 'Policy, Governance and Strategy' and 'Direct Private Equity' modules, and the second-highest rating($\star\star\star\star$) in the 'Confidence Building Measures' module. STIC remains committed to upholding the Principles for Responsible Investment and will continue to strengthen its efforts in socially responsible and sustainable investing.

TCFD Support



The Task Force on Climate-related Financial Disclosures (TCFD) is a global climate initiative established by the G20 to encourage companies to disclose the financial impact of climate change on their performance. As of 2023, more than 4,850 organizations worldwide had declared their support for the TCFD.

STIC Investments declared its support for the TCFD in August 2022 and published its first TCFD report in June 2024. Through this process, STIC has reestablished its governance and processes for managing climate-related risks, and developed a roadmap toward mid- to long-term carbon neutrality, along with a system for managing greenhouse gas emissions.



ESG Organization

ESG Committees

STIC Investments established the ESG Committee in July 2021, consisting of the Corporate ESG Committee and Fund ESG Committee.

The Corporate ESG Committee is responsible for overseeing the corporate-level ESG strategies. Its duties include making amendments to the firm's ESG policy and framework. The Fund ESG Committee is responsible for the fund-level decision making.

Currently, three executive directors—Dongguel Kwak(CIO), Shinwoo Kang(COO and CRSO), and Jinho Chai(Head of Private Equity)—serve on the Company-wide ESG Committee. Additionally, four individuals concurrently serve on the Fund-level ESG Committee: the CIO, COO & CRSO, Head of Risk Management and ESG, and Head of Strategy.

ESG Team

STIC established the ESG Team, an organization dedicated to ESG activities, in July 2021. The ESG Team promotes awareness and implementation of ESG policies and procedures across all employees. It provides ongoing support to investment teams to ensure that ESG principles are actively reflected in investment decision-making, while continuously monitoring ESG-related developments at both the corporate and fund levels.

In 2025, the ESG Team was integrated into the Risk Management and Strategy Division to enhance the efficiency of ESG due diligence for portfolio companies and to ensure the unified management of the firm-wide ESG strategy.

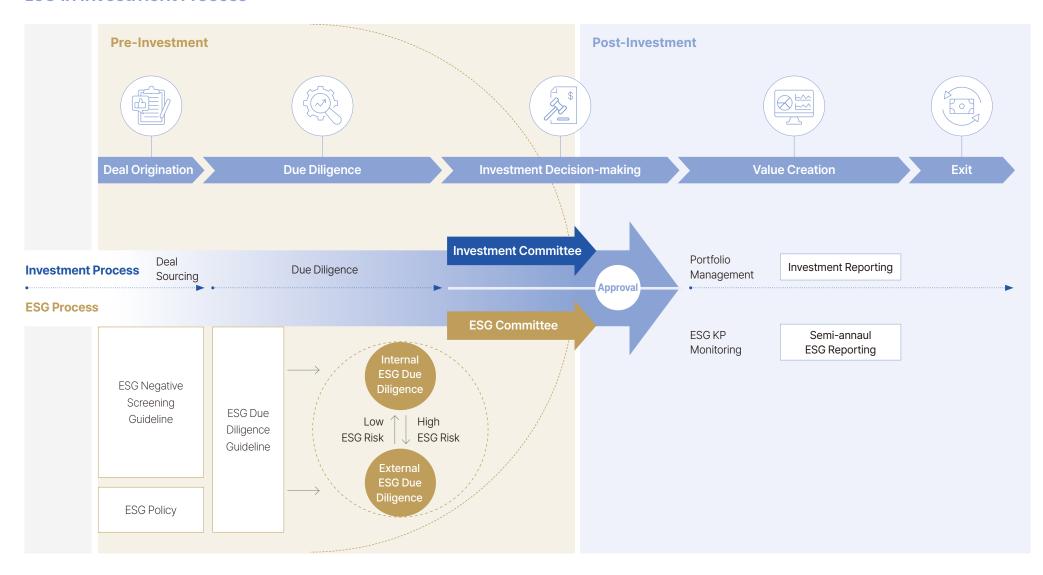

2. Responsible Investment: ESG in Investment

Pre-investment: ESG Due Diligence



 STIC Investments conducts negative screening during the preinvestment phase to exclude target companies with material negative ESG issues.



ESG risk assessments are mandated for target companies that pass the negative screening process. Utilizing the ESG
Due Diligence Guideline, STIC determines whether the ESG risk assessment should be conducted internally or by external consultants.



The risks and opportunities of target companies are evaluated based on STIC's ESG Due Diligence Questionnaire. Upon completion of the evaluation, short-term and long-term ESG tasks are derived by prioritizing the identified risks and opportunities according to significance and practicality.



The results of ESG due diligence, including ESG risks and opportunities, are submitted to the Investment Committee and the Fund ESG Committee for investment decisions. The findings are incorporated into the final investment decision-making process.

Duksan Electera

Duksan Electera contributes to the development of the electric vehicle industry through its specialization in the manufacturing and sales of electrolytes for secondary batteries. Electric vehicles lead an eco-friendly industry that substantially reduces greenhouse gas emissions compared to conventional combustion engine vehicles. Despite the alignment of STIC's ESG investment theme and Duksan Electera's business model, the company manufactures electrolytes, a chemical product that can potentially cause environmental harm. To identify potential ESG risks associated with the manufacturing process of chemicals, STIC conducted external ESG due diligence. Through thorough evaluation, environmental, occupational health and safety, and society-related risks were identified. Based on the due diligence findings, STIC established an ESG improvement roadmap and KPIs for Duksan Electera's facilities in South Korea and the United States, which are currently being monitored. Also, the ESG due diligence report is published on the website to share potential ESG risks with stakeholders.





Post-investment: ESG Monitoring

STIC Investments works closely with portfolio companies to embed ESG factors into their businesses and to pursue ESG opportunities. To create a sustainable impact, STIC has established a long-term ESG roadmap and has designated specific ESG KPIs that need to be realized.

At the closing of an investment, potential investors are provided with key ESG information and value creation opportunities pre- and post-investment phases.

Shinheung SEC

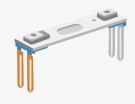
Shinheung SEC, a Korean company which manufactures safety caps for secondary batteries, worked closely with STIC to establish an effective ESG management system after facing demands on ESG regulatory burdens from their domestic and international supply chains.

Starting from ESG due diligence in August 2021 to ESG framework in February 2022, Shinheung SEC and STIC jointly participated in the six-month ESG consulting journey. A total of 18 ESG KPIs were identified and 3 KPIs were designated as a core, including a supply chain ESG due diligence, carbon emissions management, and ethics and compliance management.

STIC is jointly monitoring the establishment of Shinheung SEC's ESG framework through a quarterly ESG KPI monitoring system. As part of its ESG improvement initiatives, Shinheung SEC conducted an ESG assessment of its suppliers in 2024, which included both self-assessments and on-site audits.

In addition, Shinheung SEC opened an in-house café in 2024 and implemented inclusive hiring practices by employing individuals with disabilities. As of September 2024, a total of five employees with disabilities are working at the café.





Stewardship Code

Establishment and Implementation of the Stewardship Code

STIC Investments participated in the Korea Stewardship Code established by the Korea Corporate Governance Service(KCGS) in June 2017. STIC has established its own Stewardship Code following the 'Principles on the Stewardship Responsibilities of Institutional Investors' promulgated by KCGS.

In response to the revised stewardship code guidelines issued by the Financial Services Commission in 2024, STIC Investments updated its Stewardship Code in July 2024 to strengthen provisions related to corporate value enhancement and alignment with the UN PRI. The STIC K-Growth Fund, launched in December 2023, reports on its compliance with the Stewardship Code at annual general meetings in accordance with the fund's articles of incorporation.

Principle 1

Institutional investors, as a steward of assets entrusted by their clients, beneficiaries, etc., to take care of and manage, should formulate and publicly disclose a clear policy to faithfully implement their responsibilities.



Principle 2

Institutional investors should formulate and publicly disclose an effective and clear policy as to how to resolve actual or potential problems arising from conflicts of interest in the course of their stewardship activities.



Principle 3

Institutional investors should regularly monitor investee companies in order to enhance investee companies' mid- to long-term value and thereby protect and raise their investment value.



Principle 4

While institutional investors should aim to form a consensus with investee companies, where necessary, they should formulate internal guidelines on the timeline, procedures, and methods for stewardship activities.



Principle 5

Institutional investors should formulate and publicly disclose a voting policy that includes guidelines, procedures, and detailed standards for exercising votes in a faithful manner, and publicly disclose voting records and the reasons for each vote so as to allow the verification of the appropriateness of their voting activities.



Principle 6

Institutional investors should regularly report their voting and stewardship activities to their clients or beneficiaries.



Principle 7 Institutional investors should have the capabilities and expertise required to implement stewardship responsibilities in an active and effective manner.

STIC Investments has established an environmental management system to implement ecofriendly business practices. The Chief Operating Officer(COO), who also serves as the CEO, oversees key environmental performance and leads decision-making related to environmental risks, including climate change. The ESG Team is responsible for the day-to-day execution of environmental management, including climate-related initiatives. In addition, the ESG Committee reviews major environmental performance at least once annually.

3. Sustainable Management: ESG in Operation

To proactively address various environmental risk factors and continuously improve environmental performance, STIC Investments developed the Environmental Policy in 2023 and published it on the website. This policy outlines STIC's commitment to environment-friendly management and the installment of processes for monitoring and managing environmental risks.

Resource Circulation Initiatives

STIC Investments recognizes that small everyday actions can be the starting point of a circular economy. In 2023, STIC launched a 'No PET Bottles' campaign, which involved discontinuing the provision of bottled water in office spaces and encouraging all employees to adopt ecofriendly habits by using reusable tumblers instead of single-use plastics. As a result of this initiative, PET bottle purchases decreased from 8,260 in 2023 to 5,740 in 2024, reducing usage by approximately 2,520 bottles.

In addition, STIC implemented a 'Nespresso Capsule Recycling' campaign in 2024 to further promote a culture of circularity within the firm. Through this campaign, STIC participates in Nespresso's official recycling program by collecting used capsules in designated bins and returning them via certified collection routes—contributing to a closed-loop resource recovery system.

Environmental Management Activities

Biodiversity Conservation Activities

STIC Investments conducts its '1 Step 1 Won' charity walk twice a year as part of its ongoing social contribution efforts. In the second half of 2024, STIC initiated its support for the Peace Forest by donating approximately KRW 9.3 million to promote biodiversity conservation. STIC remains committed to fulfilling its social responsibility for a sustainable ecosystem and will continue to collaborate with various partners to advance biodiversity initiatives.

Eco-Friendly Social Contribution Activities

In 2024, STIC Investments launched an IT equipment donation initiative in partnership with People&Com to promote both resource recycling and social value creation.

This initiative involves donating decommissioned in-house computers, monitors, and laptops to support proper e-waste recycling and to improve IT accessibility for underserved communities. In 2024, the firm donated 25 laptops, 10 desktops, and 5 monitors.

This program has been recognized as a sustainable social contribution model based on circular economy principles and also helps to bridge the digital divide. STIC remains committed to expanding environmentally and socially conscious donation activities going forward.

Environmental Management Training for Employees

On December 2, 2024, STIC Investments held an environmental management training session during its monthly all-staff meeting. Oksoo Lee, a Partner at Deloitte Anjin LLC, was invited as a guest speaker and delivered a live Zoom lecture titled 'Carbon Neutral ESG Era and Eco-Friendly Strategies for Private Equity Managers'. The lecture helped raise awareness across the organization regarding the importance of environmental management and laid the groundwork for company-wide engagement.

Since establishing its ESG framework in 2021, STIC has incorporated ESG due diligence into every investment to identify both risks and opportunities associated with portfolio companies. In particular, when external advisors are engaged for ESG due diligence, STIC conducts sessions attended by all relevant team members, including members of the ESG Committee. These sessions not only cover the findings of the due diligence but also serve as platforms to share the latest developments and issues related to climate change and environmental trends effectively functioning as comprehensive internal training.

Roadmap for Climate Change

1. Introduction

STIC Investments is a private equity management firm based in South Korea and across Asia, actively engaging in investment activities through a well-established global network.

Climate change has a significant impact on STIC's business operations—not only by introducing physical and transition risks, but also by creating new investment opportunities. In this context, it is more important than ever to proactively respond to emerging climate-related risks, policy shifts, and technological innovations, and to build climate resilience by capturing opportunities presented by the energy transition. At the same time, market expectations are rising for companies to disclose their climate strategies, including responses to greenhouse gas emissions.

STIC is committed to reducing its carbon footprint across all areas of operation. In addition to managing its internal performance, STIC also systematically monitors the ESG performance of its portfolio companies, thereby actively supporting their sustainable growth.

STIC Investments recognizes climate change and the resulting shifts in the business environment as both a material risk and a source of new opportunities. As a private equity firm, STIC is committed to proactively addressing these risks and integrating climate considerations into its investment strategy.

To that end, STIC analyzes the broader environmental context surrounding its portfolio companies and identifies the potential impacts of climate change. STIC has defined both transition and physical risk factors including regulatory changes, market fluctuations, and extreme weather events—and continues to develop systematic short-, medium-, and longterm response strategies.

Climate Change Strategy

Scenario Analysis

STIC Investments analyzed the impact of transition risks on its business using scenario pathways developed by the Network for Greening the Financial System(NGFS), including the Net Zero 2050 and Below 2°C scenarios. For physical risk assessment, STIC adopted the Shared Socioeconomic Pathways(SSPs), which are emissions scenarios introduced in the IPCC's Sixth Assessment Report. These SSPs incorporate projected changes in socioeconomic systems—such as population growth, economic development, and energy consumption—along with radiative forcing levels expected by 2100.

Scenario Analysis – Transition Risk

STIC's portfolio includes sectors such as manufacturing and ICT, where carbon emissions and electricity usage represent significant risk factors. In light of the expected tightening of climate policy, the firm anticipates that exposure to transition risks will continue to grow. Accordingly, STIC conducted scenario analyses based on the Net Zero 2050 and Below 2°C pathways provided by the Network for Greening the Financial System(NGFS), assuming conditions with elevated carbon and energy costs. Under the Below 2°C scenario, carbon prices are projected to increase from USD 5.74 in 2025 to USD 259.23 by 2045. Industrial electricity prices are also expected to rise from USD 28.87 in 2025 to USD 36.39 in 2045. These trends suggest a high likelihood of declining profitability in carbon- and energy-intensive sectors.

STIC's Response to Transition Risks

STIC currently invests in carbon-intensive industries such as secondary battery manufacturing and agriculture, both domestically and internationally. Going forward, the firm plans to shift its investment strategy toward energy-based businesses—such as power generation—while avoiding future investments in carbon-heavy companies, in alignment with the scenario pathways outlined by the Network for Greening the Financial System(NGFS).

Scenario Analysis - Physical Risk

STIC conducted a physical risk assessment of its investment portfolio using the Shared Socioeconomic Pathways(SSPs) developed by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change(IPCC). The analysis indicates that coastal flooding and the spread of infectious diseases are likely to intensify across the Asia-Pacific region. Notably, South Korea and Vietnam are projected to face elevated flood risks, while Vietnam and Malaysia appear increasingly vulnerable to typhoons and storm surges.

STIC's Response to Physical Risks

STIC plans to incorporate country-specific climate risk assessments, based on scenario analysis, into its investment review process. In light of the projected rise in coastal flooding and infectious disease risks, the firm will closely evaluate the geographic exposure of its portfolio companies and intends to expand investments in industries that offer solutions to climate-related risks.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions Targets and Indicators

STIC Investments established a mid- to long-term carbon neutrality roadmap and an environmental disclosure framework in 2023. Since 2024, STIC has been systematically measuring and managing Scope 1, 2, and 3 greenhouse gas(GHG) emissions from its Seoul headquarters. Although the building is leased—making precise measurements difficult emissions are estimated based on utility-related expenses.

2. Responsible Investment: ESG in Investment

In 2024, STIC's total GHG emissions from its Seoul headquarters amounted to 369.64 tCO₂e, consisting of 306.8 tCO₂e from on-site operations(Scope 1 and 2) and 37.96 tCO₂e from off-site activities (Scope 3).

STIC does not operate manufacturing facilities requiring combustion equipment, but includes fuel combustion from company vehicles under Scope 1. Scope 2 emissions are calculated based on electricity and steam consumption within office spaces. Scope 3 emissions account for capital goods and business travel.

STIC plans to further strengthen its GHG emissions management going forward and aims to expand its Scope 3 coverage to enhance the transparency and granularity of its climate-related disclosures.

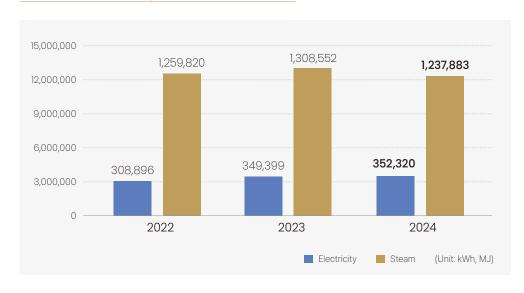

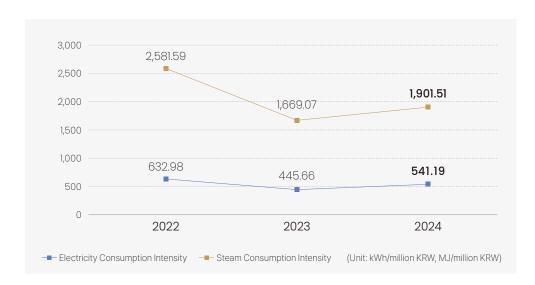
Based on the mid- to long-term carbon neutrality roadmap and environmental disclosure framework established in 2023, STIC Investments has been systematically managing the environmental performance of its Seoul headquarters since that year. Although the building is leased—making precise calculations challenging—STIC estimates its energy consumption based on related utility costs.

2. Responsible Investment: ESG in Investment

Energy usage at the Seoul headquarters is categorized into electricity and steam(hot water and heating). In 2024, electricity consumption totaled 352,320 kWh, while steam consumption reached 1,237,883 MJ.

2024 Newly Hired Female Employees Ratio





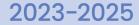

Corporate Philanthropy

STIC Investments aims to establish a sustainable business ecosystem by linking its corporate social responsibility(CSR) vision with ESG activities. The contribution to local communities through philanthropic activities in which all employees engage aims to solve societal problems around the world.

Sisterhood Relationship with Pocheon Bidulginang Village

STIC established the sisterhood relationship with Pocheon Bidulginang Village in 2017 to initiate volunteer activities twice a year and donate development funds under the name of the Vice Chairman of STIC, Dongguel Kwak, who was appointed as the Honorary Mayor of Bidulginang Village. In the Fall of 2024, STIC employees visited Bidulginang Village as Kimchi-making volunteers, and Kimchi was donated to elderly residents who were living alone in the village alongside KRW 20 million to be used for community development.

UAE Akh 1 Troop 1 Company Affiliation

In 2018, STIC signed the 'One Troop One Company' affiliation with the Akh unit, a Korean special unit dispatched to the United Arab Emirates — the first affiliation with an overseas dispatched unit. After its first donation, STIC continues to donate to the Akh unit, donating approximately KRW 13.33 million to improve the military unit welfare in 2024.

1 Step 1 Won Donation Event

As a part of its philanthropic activities, STIC organizes a semi-annual event called '1 Step 1 Won Donation Event' to fundraise donations through the total number of footsteps that employees take in the walking donation event. For the two events held in the spring and fall of 2024, STIC donated the footstep-matched donation of approximately KRW 36.35 million to the Merry Year Foundation, World Food Programme(WFP), and Peace Forest.

Sponsorship of the Korea Baduk Association

Since the end of 2024, STIC has provided annual sponsorship of KRW 100 million to the Korea Baduk Association as part of its commitment to nurturing young talent in the game of baduk and fulfilling its social responsibility to promote cultural development. As part of this initiative, the Korea Baduk Association operates the 'STIC U-23 Baduk Championship,' a youth tournament open to players born after 2002. The first championship concluded with its final match in April 2025, where 9-dan Woojin Han was crowned the inaugural winner.

Audit Committee

STIC Investments operates an Audit Committee under the Board of Directors as a key mechanism to promote transparency and enhance shareholder value. The committee is composed entirely of independent and qualified outside directors. It plays a critical role in ensuring the integrity of financial reporting and internal controls, while serving as an independent oversight body that strengthens accountability and supports the establishment of a responsible governance structure.

Nomination Committee for Outside Directors

To protect shareholder rights and enhance board independence, STIC Investments operates a Nomination Committee for Outside Directors under the Board of Directors. This committee functions independently from the Board and is responsible for screening and recommending director candidates based on objective criteria. The committee evaluates candidates holistically, considering factors such as integrity, professional expertise, independence, and their potential to contribute to enhancing corporate value. Its guiding principle is to recommend individuals who serve the best interests of both the company and its shareholders.
